


Hurricane Helene: (almost) one year later

Hurricane Helene was arguably the worst disaster in North Carolina history.

Western North Carolina's post-Helene **economic recovery** began in earnest in November 2024 and has shown signs of progress with each passing month.

However, as more data come in, we are learning that the **economic impact** of Helene was **larger than initially estimated**, and so far, by several measures, counties affected by the storm have experienced an **incomplete economic recovery**.





Hurricane Helene: (almost) one year later Where are we now?

Despite a partial rebound, the WNC labor market continues to suffer

- Job losses were larger than we initially thought. Unemployment rates remain elevated.
- Some jobseekers may need help addressing barriers to re-employment.
- Did the region lose population? (TBD)

Some sectors are growing, but others (like tourism) are taking longer to recover

- Retail sales and electricity demand recovered to pre-hurricane levels by Jan 2025.
- However, airport traffic is down 6% over-the-year, while Buncombe County lodging revenue is down 21% over-the-year as of Jun 2025.
