Rural Transformation Grant Fund Environmental Review Guide

The North Carolina Department of Commerce, Rural Economic Development Division (REDD), prepared this Environmental Review Guide (Guide) to ensure that grantees are aware that federal environmental laws may apply to projects approved for Rural Transformation Grant Fund (RTGF) grants. Grantee must comply with the requirements of the <u>North Carolina State</u> <u>Environmental Policy Act</u>.

This Guide lists federal environmental laws that may impact the planning and implementation of an approved Rural Transformation Grant Fund (RTGF) project. However, this Guide is not intended to be an exhaustive catalog of all potentially relevant federal environmental laws and regulations.

The following questions will assist grantees in identifying the federal environmental laws that may apply. however, the grantee must perform the proper due diligence to ensure its project complies with all applicable laws. Grantees must submit a copy of this Guide with their responses to the questions, via the REDD Rural Connect Portal, prior to requesting RTGF funds. Additionally, grantees must retain records, permits, and documentation necessary to verify compliance with all environmental requirements.

COASTAL AREA MANAGEMENT ACT (CAMA) and COASTAL BARRIER RESOURCES ACT (CBRA)
