





COVID-19 Workforce Supporting Solutions

- Leveraged virtual technology to support individuals and employers. However full access remains a challenge.
- Across these agencies approximately \$44 million was received in CARES Act funding.
- Used CARES Act funding to scaffold support for individuals and employers, including shortterm training, rental assistance, and specialized counseling for businesses.

- **Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI)** training for staff.
- Identifying specific resources for business owners of color and women.

Equity

- Expanding current work to engage more North Carolinians and the development of new initiatives such as Title II's "Digital Equity Project" to support digital and access to devices for adults.
- Identified need to support businesses with hiring individuals with disabilities.
