Optimism for N.C.'s 2012 economic rebound anchored by top-notch business environment

Confidence and optimism are the buzz words being heard in economic circles this month as business leaders discuss the outlook for North Carolina in 2012. Positive trends in the state's economic indicators are evident, and while gains may be slower than past recoveries, they are steadily on the rise in North Carolina.

Governor Bev Perdue emphasized optimism for the state's economic future during the 10th Annual Economic Forecast Forum held Jan. 3, sponsored by the N.C. Bankers

Association and the N.C. Chamber. Unemployment rates are predicted to decline. Economic growth is expected to climb. North Carolina is expected to nearly double the number of jobs it will add in 2012 over the number added in 2011.

- North Carolina is consistently top-ranked for its business climate.
- North Carolina is one of the most innovative states in the United States.

Carolina Prime Pets to relocate to Lenoir

Carolina Prime Pets, which is currently located in Murphy and makes dog treats, plans to relocate to Lenoir and hire up to 150 workers within the next two years, according to information from Caldwell County. That's the largest number of new jobs announced in the county in years, according to a release from Caldwell County Economic Development Commission.

An official announcement about the company's relocation to the area is scheduled for 10 a.m. Jan. 10 on the upper level of Broyhill Civic Center on U.S. 321. The announcement is expected following the regular meeting of the Caldwell County Economic Development Commission. Company, county and state officials are expected to be at the announcement.

Tourism efforts promote Civil War sesquicentennial

The N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of Tourism, Film and Sports Development is promoting Civil War-related attractions and events across virtually all of its programs throughout the sesquicentennial period.

North Carolina is one of several states participating in Civil War Trails, a groundbreaking history/tourism initiative that has installed more than 1,000 interpretive wayside markers at historic sites in North Carolina, Maryland, Virginia, Tennessee, West Virginia and Gettysburg, Penn. North Carolina has 232 commemorative markers in 78 counties.

The Williamston Economic Restructuring Committee is working on targeted business recruitment for the downtown. It will contact businesses within the region to consider Williamston for expansion or relocation. Businesses targeted would be to fill gaps in the retail market, such as jewelry stores, clothing, home, and garden. It will also participate in the Strategic Economic Development plan implementation for the county and towns. Williamston is part of the N.C. Department of Commerce's Small Town Main Street Program.

Saying "it's been a great 34 years," Craig Madison, president and CEO of the Grove Park Inn Resort & Spa in Asheville, resigned Jan. 3, according to a statement issued by the historic resort.

Madison co-founded the Asheville advertising firm The Alpha Group in 1978 and served as its president. The following year, the Grove Park Inn hired The Alpha Group to handle its food and beverage advertising. After five years of that work, Madison was retained as director of marketing for the resort. He was named the Grove Park Inn's general manager in 1999, then named president and CEO in 2003.

Madison has also been active in the community, serving on boards including the N. C. Travel and Tourism Board, the N.C. Travel and Tourism Coalition, AdvantageWest Regional Economic Partnership and UNC Asheville's and Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College's foundation boards.

Tengion completes move to Winston-Salem

Tengion Inc. confirmed Jan. 5 that it has finished moving its headquarters to its Winston-Salem operations.

The move by the biotechnology company had been expected since it said Nov. 14 that it was concentrating its research and development operations in Winston-Salem as part of a major restructuring.

The company eliminated 15 jobs each in Winston-Salem and East Norriton, Penn., where the company was based, as part of the restructuring. The cuts included several executive positions.
