Daimler Trucks to add nearly 1,200 jobs in N.C. this year

Governor Bev Perdue on Jan. 12 joined Daimler Trucks North America in announcing plans to add a second shift at its Freightliner Truck Manufacturing Plant in Cleveland. The expansion will create more than 1,100 jobs by the end of 2012. DTNA also plans to hire 100 employees at its nearby Components and Logistics Plant in Gastonia. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Martyn Johnson</u> was the developer on this project.

"My top priority is creating jobs, and today's announcement shows that our strategy is working," said Perdue. "Globally competitive companies like Daimler realize the value of North Carolina's highly skilled workforce and our customized training programs. We look forward to continuing our long-standing partnership with Daimler."

A majority of the positions in Cleveland will be filled with recalled workers who were laid off in 2009. The plant exclusively produces Class 8 on-highway truck models, including the Cascadia, Columbia and Argosy product lines. Hiring of new employees is expected to begin in February and the new production shift is slated to be at full capacity by September 2012.

Forsyth Tech. set to open Transportation Technology Center

The transformation of the former Pinebrook Shopping Center into Forsyth Technical Community College's Transportation Technology Center will be officially unveiled today (Jan. 17), according to a press release from the college.

The state-of-the-art facility will house six automotive programs, including Richard Childress Race Car Technology, Collision Repair and Refinishing, and Motorcycle Maintenance, in the uniquely designed 139,000 square feet of space. "We are extremely proud of our new Transportation Technology Center and the advanced training and educational opportunities it offers our transportation students," said Dr. Gary Green, president, Forsyth Tech., in the release. <u>Read</u> <u>more</u>. press conference Wednesday.

A three-year tournament agreement is in place.

The announcement comes six weeks after Chiquita decided to relocate its global headquarters to Charlotte. Chiquita chairman and chief executive officer Fernando Aguirre says the company was determined to make a positive impact in the Charlotte community and "bringing a fantastic golf tournament here will do just that."

Carolina Prime Pets chooses to stay in N.C.

Good utility rates and the area's people were the driving force behind a company relocating to Lenoir and creating new jobs. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Cindy Messer</u> was the developer on this project.

Van Brown, owner of Carolina Prime Pets, said Jan. 10 that the move also coincided with more personal reasons to be in the area.

Brown was the man of the hour at the Broyhill Civic Center on Jan. 10 during the official announcement that he's moving his company into the former NACCO Industries building on Morganton Boulevard SW, in Lenoir. It will create around 150 jobs within the next two to three years. Carolina Prime Pets, which makes pet treats, currently leases a 60,000square-foot space in Murphy and employs around 25 workers, Brown said.

The company plans to buy and renovate the 277,411-square-foot NACCO Industries building for around \$4.5 million. Its major customers include PetSmart, Petco and Costco, as well as private labels for grocery chains, Brown said.

First charging station for electric vehicles at N.C. rest area formally opens to public

History was made last week as officials from the N.C. Department of Transportation, N.C. Department of Commerce and Praxis Technologies Inc. joined together to cut the ribbon on one of the first electric vehicle charging stations at a state rest area. The ceremony took place at the Alamance County Rest Area on I-40/I-85 near Burlington, which is now the site of two charging stations. A Nissan Leaf from Michael Jordan Nissan of Durham was on site to provide a demonstration of the charging stations.

The electric vehicle charging stations, as well as accompanying educational signage, were provided by Raleighbased Praxis Technologies Inc. through a grant from the N.C. Department of Commerce Green Business Fund Program. In addition to the charging stations at the Alamance County Rest Area, Praxis provided two more charging stations to NCDOT, which were recently installed at the rest area located along I-40 at the I-95 junction near Benson. The charging stations are classified as "Level 2," which means they can fully charge a vehicle in 6-7 hours. There is no cost for using the stations.

The N.C. Department of Commerce grant, which totaled \$247,000, has enabled Praxis to place 20 electric vehicle charging stations in key markets around North Carolina over the past eight months. <u>Read more</u>. <u>See a Flickr gallery</u> of the event.
