Perdue announces small business initiatives

Gov. Bev Perdue on Jan. 13 announced her major policy priorities for the coming year - jobs and the economy, education, setting government straight, and keeping communities safe. Perdue's goals in each of these areas will help North Carolina emerge from the economic recession stronger than before. Perdue outlined her initiatives during speeches to the Charlotte Chamber and the Greensboro Partnership last week.

For Perdue, keeping and growing jobs in North Carolina is her No.1 priority - and she recognizes the need for North Carolina to focus its economic development efforts not only on large companies, but also on the small businesses that make up 98 percent of all state businesses.

During her address, she announced the launch of a statewide small business initiative called Biz Boost. Biz Boost will help small businesses apply for credit, work on staffing, manage cash, and reduced costs. It will give small businesses access to the same kind of outside talent that big businesses often use to help them adapt and grow. The initiative has been successfully piloted already in Charlotte and will be replicated statewide through Commerce and the N.C. N.C. State parks set attendance record

State parks in North Carolina reported record attendance in 2009 of 14.16 million visits, a jump of 13 percent over the previous year, and up 5 percent from the previous record set in 2007, according to the N.C. Division of Parks and Recreation. Over the past 25 years, the state parks system has seen a dramatic 238 percent increase in visitation. Among the parks and recreation areas, 22 reported increases in attendance in 2009. Jockey's Ridge State Park in Dare County reported the highest attendance at 1.4 million visits, an increase of 2 percent over last year. Other parks with significant increases were Cliffs of the Neuse State Park in Wayne County (42 percent), Crowders Mountain State Park in Gaston County (58 percent), Dismal Swamp State Park in Camden County (59 percent), Jordan Lake State Recreation Area in Chatham County (52 percent) and Mount Mitchell State Park in Yancey County (77 percent). "We must re focus our state's public schools on a single goal. Every kid - no matter where he or she lives in North Carolina must graduate from high school with what it really takes to succeed in a career, in a two- or four-year college or technical training," said Gov. Perdue. "That means no more losing out on jobs that require more than low skills and no more remedial courses in college. Graduates will have what it really takes."

North Carolina's Educational Governing Boards - including the State Board of Education, the UNC Board of Governors, the N.C. State Board of Community Colleges and the N.C. Independent Colleges & Universities Board of Directors - are critical partners in Perdue's plans for education in our state. Four communities awarded CDBG funds

The Division of Community Assistance has awarded almost \$1 million dollars in Community Development Block Grant funds to four communities under the Small Business Entrepreneurial Assistance (SBEA) program. Alexander County, the Town of Hudson, and City of Kings Mountain each received \$250,000. Hyde County received \$245,000. The funds will finance renovations and expansions of eight companies, leading to the creation of 40 new jobs. The SBEA program, now in its third year, is part of an ongoing state-wide effort to assist small businesses and encourage place-based economic development. Eligible applicants include all non-entitlement local governments with a preference given to Tier 1 and 21st Century communities. Enrollment continues to climb in '12 in 6' program

The Division of Workforce Development continues to track the progress of Gov. Bev Perdue's <u>JobsNOW</u> "12 in 6" initiative. The community colleges have been asked to provide monthly reports regarding the number of students enrolled, courses offered and the number of jobs created and maintained. The numbers through Dec. 31 show that 6,382 students are enrolled in the program (up from 5,427 as of Nov. 30), and 790 courses have been offered (up from 686 as of Nov. 30).

RayLen Vineyards & Winery in Mocksville is using an innovative, solar-powered system to lower overhead while filling over 10,000 cases of wine each year. RayLen's Steve Shepard is not only using the sun to harvest his grapes at RayLen, but using that energy to power his entire business for things like refrigeration, heating and cooling. "We anticipate a savings of almost 50 percent on the total cost of our energy bills," said Shepard.

The seven inductees are Herb Appenzeller, a Wake Forest football player in the 1940s and long-time athletic director at Guilford College; Jim Donnan, a highly successful football coach at the University of Georgia and former quarterback for N.C. State University; Don McCauley, an All-America running back at the University of North Carolina and Baltimore Colts pro bowler; Carla Overbeck, a three-time All-America soccer star at UNC-Chapel Hill who now coaches at Duke University; Mike Quick, an outstanding receiver at N.C. State and top draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles; Karen Shelton, whose UNC-Chapel Hill field hockey teams have won seven national titles; and Paul Simson, one of the state's most accomplished amateur golfers with two British Amateur Senior Open championships among his victories. The ceremony will take place May 13 in Raleigh.
