Reser's to bring 500 jobs to Halifax County

Gov. Bev Perdue on Jan. 19 announced that Reser's Fine Foods, a national producer of prepared foods and salads, will expand its plant to the Halifax Industrial Center in Halifax County. The company plans to create 500 jobs in three phases over the next five years. The announcement was made possible in part by a \$1 million grant from the One North Carolina Fund. Commerce's Tim Ivey was the developer on this project.

"We are working hard to create jobs and North Carolina is proud to host a national-brand business like Reser's Fine Foods, which is building on its success here," Perdue said. "Our state's strategic location, skilled workers and top business climate continue to attract growing companies from around the nation."

Reser's Fine Foods Inc., headquartered in Oregon, makes prepared salads, dips, side dishes. Mexican foods and specialty products under a variety of brand names. The company has facilities nationwide. The company's goal is to expand production of prepared foods at its Halifax plant, starting with a first-phase investment of \$15 million in 2010.

John Hardin, executive director of Commerce's Office of Science and Technology, participated in a panel discussion in Washington, D.C., on Jan. 20 to assist a working group of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST). The panel is part of the council's ongoing review of the National Nanotechnology Initiative (NNI), which began in 2003 and is the highest-priority funded science and technology effort since the space

Nanotechnology is the ability to measure, see and assemble objects on the scale of atoms and molecules. Unlike a stand-alone industry, nanotechnology is an enabling technology creating a wealth of new materials and manufacturing possibilities. Nanotechnology can be used in almost all industries. States such as North Carolina can draw on it to capitalize on the sectors they have already worked hard to build.

Hardin outlined North Carolina's nanotechnology activities for the PCAST panel and participated in discussions on how to strengthen the national effort. His recommendations included enhancing efforts to track where and how NNI dollars are spent, expanding efforts to commercialize nanotechnology-based innovations, appointing state liaisons to the NNI, and

Celgard to add 289 jobs in Concord, Charlotte

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Jan. 20 that Charlotte-based Celgard LLC, a wholly owned subsidiary of Polypore International Inc. will create 289 jobs and invest a total of \$91 million in expanded and new infrastructure in Mecklenburg and Cabarrus counties over the next five years. Commerce's Ron Leitch was the developer on this project.

The company is a global leader in developing and producing specialty membranes used predominantly in the lithium battery industry. The expansion is designed to increase production capacity to supply lithium battery manufacturers focused on the Electric Drive Vehicle industry.

"Celgard is an innovative, forward-thinking North Carolina company that is helping us realize the promise of a greener economy," Perdue said. "These are exactly the types of jobs I envisioned when we started building the number of 'green-collar' jobs in our state."

Celgard plans to expand its Charlotte campus, which currently employs about 390 workers, and add 80 jobs. A second facility will be built in Concord, which will employ 209 workers by the end of 2014, contingent on approval of local incentives. While salaries will vary by job function, the overall average wage for the 289 new jobs will be \$56,960 not including benefits. That is higher than both the Cabarrus annual average of \$32,396 and the Mecklenburg average of \$48,776. Read more.


Carroll delivers keynote at Henderson-Vance County Chamber event

N.C. to get \$28.2M in broadband recovery funding

Gov. Bev Perdue on Jan. 20 announced that MCNC has received \$28.2 million in broadband funding through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) to build a 480-mile fiber-optic network for the N.C. Research and Education Network (NCREN). The design, construction and operation of the network are estimated to create more than 230 engineering and construction jobs. In addition, the network has the potential to serve more than 1,500 school and community institutions, 180,000 businesses and more than 300,000 underserved families.

"Increased broadband access for underserved areas is a critical infrastructure improvement that will help businesses of all sizes create jobs," said Perdue. "NCREN will also play a vital role as part of my Career and College - Ready, Set, Go! Initiative—which will help ensure those businesses have access to a well-trained workforce."

This funding will allow North Carolina to leverage the existing NCREN to create more robust access for our schools, libraries and public health facilities, while also reaching our underserved citizens.

MCNC will begin immediately to undertake the work of planning and building the new middle-mile fiber. Within the next 60 days, MCNC will issue several requests for proposal (RFP) for the design, construction and operation of the network. Construction is expected to last up to three years.

The new fiber build will traverse 37 counties in North Carolina. Counties in eastern N.C. include Beaufort, Bladen, Carteret, Columbus, Craven, Cumberland, Edgecombe, Greene, Harnett, Johnston, Nash, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender, Pitt, Robeson, Wake, and Wilson. In the west, counties include Alexander, Buncombe, Burke, Caldwell, Catawba, Cleveland, Davidson, Davie, Gaston, Haywood, Henderson, Iredell, Jackson, Lincoln, McDowell, Mecklenburg, Polk, Rutherford, and Transylvania. Two communities receive grants

Commerce's Finance Center recently announced grants to two communities:

The Town of Maiden will receive nearly \$335,000 in Industrial Development Funds to connect the city sewer system to Apple Inc.'s proposed 500,000-square-foot data center. The upgrade will allow Apple to proceed with the data center project, which includes a \$1 billion company investment and the creation of 50 new jobs over the next two years.

The City of Trinity will receive \$100,000 in Industrial Development Funds to provide public sewer service for the expansion of an existing manufacturing plant. The work will allow Trinity Furniture - which currently has a failing industrial septic system - to increase production and create 10 new jobs.



Indian ambassador visits Charlotte

Indian Ambassador to the U.S. Meera Shankar spoke at an event in Charlotte on Jan. 21 and discussed the growing commercial ties between the India and the U.S. During a luncheon hosted by the World Affairs Council, Shankar reflected on cooperation between the two countries, and new opportunities to strengthen bilateral trade and investment.

The Indian market, and its one billion-plus population, presents lucrative and diverse opportunities for N.C. exporters. Exports from North Carolina to India have tripled from 2002 to 2008. With a growth rate averaging between 8 to 9 percent, India is now the second fastest emerging market in the world for U.S. exporters. Best prospects and leading sectors for exports include telecommunications, healthcare, clean energy, education services, information technology and security equipment.

Spirit plant on schedule for April deadline

Spirit AeroSystems officials expect the company's Kinston plant to be complete by the April deadline, according to an article in the Kinston Free Press. Rick Davis, the company's North Carolina site operations director, told the newspaper that workers are now pouring the concrete floors in the 500,000 square-foot Global TransPark plant and installing the first pieces of manufacturing equipment. The factory should be complete by April, and an office "mezzanine" above the factory should be finished by June. Once Spirit begins hiring workers, it will then be able to consider applicants who have completed the aerospace manufacturing program at Lenoir Community College.
