Decker Visits Wireless Research Center of **North Carolina**

The Wireless Research Center of North Carolina and Mayor Vivian Jones of the Town of Wake Forest welcomed N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker on Feb. 3, as she toured the facility and discussed the economic development impact of the wireless industry. The Wireless Center, which was created as a public asset, facilitates public private partnerships, provides CTIA-certified testing, encourages entrepreneurial endeavors, and is preparing to help address the broadband access needs of rural North Carolina.

'North Carolina can be a center of excellence in wireless and broadband technology," stated Decker. "There is great opportunity for job growth in wireless, and for that reason it becomes even more critical to increase the reach of broadband into our rural communities. We can level the

B&I Division releases 2013 Sales Report

The N.C. Department of Commerce's Business & Industry Division has released its annual Sales Report for calendar year 2013. The report summarizes announced jobs, investment statistics and several other metrics followed closely by the Division, such as project activity by industry sector and follow-up meetings with existing industries.

In total, 17,996 jobs were announced in 2013, up 7 percent from the previous year. In addition, \$2.7 billion of investment was announced. Top 10 project announcments by job level last year included MetLife's decision to locate in Mecklenburg and Wake counties, Sunstone Water Group's new facility in Franklin County, and Electrolux Home Products expansion in Mecklenburg County.

ARC Offers Students and Teachers Opportunity to Study at Oak Ridge National Laboratory Institute

Applications are now being accepted for students and teachers wishing to study at one of the nation's most elite centers of research. The Appalachian Regional Commission is pleased to announce that it is collaborating with the U.S. Department of Energy's Oak Ridge National Laboratory and the Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education in Oak Ridge, Tenn. to provide two residential, hands-on learning institutes focusing on math, science, and technology for high school students and teachers (July 5-18) and for middle school students (July 13-18). Twenty-six students and 26 teachers from throughout Appalachia will participate in a hands-on learning program that will focus on the application of math and science principles in the world of work.

Students work in teams on research projects during the one-week academy, with each team comprising three to six students. The team approach provides an opportunity to conduct research activities and solve problems in a group setting. Research topics and activities may include such areas as biofuels and alternative energy. Interested parties can view examples of the research and other activities engaged in during previous summer science camps at the SummerSTEM website.

The participants will spend most days in one of several ORNL research laboratories, but field trips to nearby industries, universities, and museums will illustrate applications of math and science in the real world and provide participants with opportunities to learn more about Appalachia and some of its unique characteristics.
