Ammunition manufacturer to create 150 jobs in Robeson County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on May 15 that Cape Fear Arsenal Inc. will locate a new manufacturing facility in Robeson County. The company plans to create 150 jobs and invest more than \$15.2 million over the next three years in Lumberton. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Ken Allen</u> was the developer on this project.

"Our state has a strong manufacturing legacy," said McCrory. "This new facility advances that legacy with an innovative process that will result in much-needed, well-paying jobs for workers in Robeson County."

Cape Fear Arsenal is a privately-held corporation focusing on providing high quality ammunition products in the Southeast U.S. Its products will be primarily sold to law enforcement. The company also anticipates bidding on contracts for the military and state agencies.

"Cape Fear Arsenal's decision to locate this facility in Robeson County is a big win for the region and state," said Decker. "Our commitment to spurring economic growth continues to bring good-paying, high-skilled jobs for North Carolina families."

The project was made possible in part by a performancebased grant from the <u>One North Carolina Fund</u> of up to \$490,000. The One N.C. Fund provides financial assistance, through local governments, to attract business projects that will stimulate economic activity and create new jobs in the state. Companies receive no money up front and must meet job creation and investment performance standards to qualify for grant funds. These grants also require and are contingent upon local matches.

Other partners that helped with this project include: N.C. Community Colleges, Robeson County, City of Lumberton, Robeson County Economic Development Commission and the Robeson County Committee of 100. <u>Read more</u>.

Syngenta opens unique \$72 million Advanced Crop Lab

Syngenta unveiled its new crop research facility during a grand opening celebration on May 17 at the company's RTP Innovation Center. The first-of-its-kind, \$72 million Advanced Crop Lab allows company researchers to simulate any agricultural climate and precisely measure plant inputs the key to helping farmers grow more food from fewer resources.

"Our new Advanced Crop Lab allows us to bring together components of all research where we can create environments for multiple crops from multiple regions simultaneously," said Syngenta Head of Biotechnology Michiel van Lookeren Campagne. "Individual controls of temperature, light and carbon dioxide levels, as well as humidity control in many growth chambers, provide tailored environments that allow our talented researchers to work on specific grower challenges. In addition to innovative facilities, being in RTP, we have access to some of the greatest scientific minds to help farmers grow more from less."

Housing 30 climate-controlled growth environments in all-glass greenhouses, Syngenta can simulate conditions from Iowa in one room and from Africa right next to it. This flexibility allows company researchers to focus on developing agricultural traits that optimize crop yields, use resources efficiently and resist various stresses that farmers face every day across the globe.

Biomass energy company Enviva opens new wood pellet production facility in Northampton County

Monday (May 20), Governor Pat McCrory and John Keppler, the Chairman and CEO of biomass energy firm Enviva celebrated the grand opening of the company's newest wood pellet production facility in Northampton County. The facility, with the capacity to produce 500,000 metric tons of material a year, will have a significant economic impact in the region and employs 79 full time workers.

"Global demand for biomass energy is projected to increase substantially over the next decade," said Mr. Keppler. "Our manufacturing footprint in North Carolina plays an important role in meeting that demand and in delivering environmental and economic benefits both to our customers and to the region's forests, timber owners, and logging and manufacturing workforce."

"Enviva's decision to locate this facility in Northampton County is a big win for the region, the forest products industry and the State of North Carolina," said Governor McCrory. "They are creating good jobs in a growing industry and represent exactly the kind of business North Carolina needs to continue to attract to our state."

During the grand opening, Governor Pat McCrory, N.C. Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler, U.S. Senator Kay Hagan, growers and many others toured the new plant research facility.

"Syngenta invests more than \$1.25 billion annually to directly focus on solving challenges for farmers. As we consider global food security, the research conducted in our new crop lab will be essential to meet that demand," said Syngenta North America Region Director Vern Hawkins.

Design elements of the new facility include insulated glass walls that provide a virtually shadowless indoor environment, a liquid "fertigation" system to feed and water the plants and an automated roof-washing system. The building is Green Globes Certified, which recognizes the company's sustainable construction processes. In constructing the new facility, Syngenta reclaimed a former industrial site and recycled more than 85 percent of those materials.

The 136,000-square-foot facility is located within the 50-acre Syngenta RTP Innovation Center. Construction began in 2011 and was performed by nearly 300 local contractors, requiring roughly 500,000 man-hours to complete. Syngenta added 15 highly-skilled jobs to its existing RTP workforce.



Amtrak's *Piedmont* fastestgrowing in U.S.

Amtrak's *Piedmont* train service was number one in the nation in growth within the Amtrak system during fiscal year 2012. According to Amtrak reports, March 2013 saw a 10 percent increase in *Piedmont* ridership over March 2012, and a 21 percent increase in revenue over the same period. The Carolinian, which saw a suspension of service for most of March last year for track work, had a 61 percent increase in ridership in March over last year, and a 90 percent increase in revenue. The Amtrak *Piedmont* train makes two round trips between Raleigh and Charlotte each day, and serves seven other North Carolina cities - Cary, Durham, Burlington, Greensboro, High Point, Salisbury and Kannapolis. The state-supported Amtrak Carolinian train also makes one round trip each day serving the same locations. Each year, more than 938,000 passengers ride

Chen, who serves as director of foreign operations for the International Trade Division at Commerce, is a graduate of the Johns Hopkins University and the University of North Carolina School of Law.

"I am honored to have been selected as a Marshall Memorial Fellow," Chen said. "I'm thrilled to learn more about these countries' strategies on trade and investment promotion, particularly in those industries in which I work. It's clear to me that there is a great deal of accrued knowledge that we can use to expand opportunities for our state's businesses in today's global economy."

Canadian tour operators experience Currituck, Dare counties

Earlier this month, the N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of Tourism, Film and Sports Development, along with the Outer Banks Visitors Bureau and Visit Currituck, hosted four Canadian tour operators and one Canadian airline host to Currituck and Dare counties. The familiarization tour consisted of hotel site inspections, hang-gliding, restaurant tours, lighthouses, beaches, a visit to the Wright Brothers National Memorial, and wild horse adventure tours. The Division continues to educate and excite travel professionals and consumers throughout Canada, bringing more Canadians to the state year-round. Last year, nearly 450,000 Canadians visited the state, spending \$144.5 million dollars. Boone ranked 4th for restaurant growth; Laurinburg and Kill Devil Hills also among top 10

Boone recently landed among the top five cities in the nation on Nielsen's annual Restaurant Growth Index. According to the company, the Restaurant Growth Index, or RGI, "charts restaurant openings and sales to identify the nation's hottest markets." Boone landed at No. 4 on the list, behind Ocean Pines, Md., Findlay, Ohio, and Liberal, Kan. "Boone is a tourist destination, drawing 225,000 each year. It's also home to Appalachian State University, which has seen dramatic growth in the last decade and ranks in the top 5 percent for general business growth in Nielsen's BGI. The influx of students and tourists helped drive up its 2013 RGI score," an article by Nielsen's John Torres and Song Lin stated.

Lauringburg and Kill Devil Hills were also among the top 10, ranked #8 and #9, respectively. The index was based on total restaurant counts and sales for 2012, which are derived from data collected by the U.S. Census Bureau, Nielsen and Infogroup. The Nielsen Company conducts market research to track consumer trends.

Bayer CropScience opens new Development North America facilities in RTP

With the expansion of its North American headquarters in Research Triangle Park, Bayer CropScience continues to develop sustainable solutions for farmers around the world as well as for the communities where we live, work and play. The crop protection company celebrated the opening of its new Development North America facilities and laboratories earlier this month. These facilities boast 40,000 square feet of space in which nearly 70 scientists will conduct crop protection and environmental science research, including pest and turf and ornamentals management. The renovations and remodeling, a combined investment of \$16.1 million, will allow Development North America to serve as the global center for seed growth formulations as well as the U.S. center for product safety and seed growth technology. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Dallas Hardenbrook was the original developer working with Bayer CropScience.

"The agriculture community, professional pest managers and amateur gardeners stand to benefit greatly from expanded facilities and research capabilities," said Dr. Bob Graney, head of Development North America for Bayer CropScience. "The concentration of innovation and development efforts at the Research Triangle Park campus will allow Bayer CropScience to leverage knowledge and increase collaborations among scientists to grow a healthier world in which we live, work and play."

During the opening celebration, Graney was joined by Dr. Adrian Percy, global head of regulatory affairs, and Development North America employees as they demonstrated the role that the facilities and laboratories will play in Bayer CropScience's overall research and development strategy. In addition to studying seed growth, scientists will work with some of agriculture's brightest minds on human and environmental safety.

Development activities in the new facilities include testing and developing new chemistries for seed growth formulations and performing a range of safety studies to ensure Bayer CropScience products are safe both to the environment and consumers.
