For small and mid-size business in North Carolina impacted by Hurricane Irene, there are recovery resources available to you. The <u>Small Business and Technology</u> <u>Development Center</u> provides disaster assistance for North Carolina's small and midsized businesses. If your business is affected by a disaster you can receive free assistance While Silicon Valley, Boston and Houston are the traditional leaders in the industry, Raleigh earned a place in the rankings in 2009 and has been climbing ever since. According to its website, COIN "supports those organizations that are most-impacted by the convergence of nano (advanced materials) and bio (life sciences) by ensuring that they have immediate structured access to all relevant resources and a conduit to key regulatory agencies impacting the field. P&G Manufacturing to create 32 jobs in Beaufort County

Governor Bev Perdue on Aug. 26 announced that P&G Manufacturing will build a manufacturing facility that will increase its capacity to produce air filtration equipment in Washington. The company expects to create 32 full time jobs and invest \$4 million in the plant by 2012. The project was made possible in part by a \$96,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

"My top priority as Governor is growing jobs," said Perdue. "P&G Manufacturing has grown in North Carolina since 1976. This grant will help the company nearly double its workforce and greatly expand its facility. Like so many other companies, P&G Manufacturing has succeeded because it is able to tap into our skilled, well-trained workforce."

This 50,000-square-foot facility will allow the company to consolidate operations into one building and provide the space needed for additional equipment. PGM manufactures a wide array of air filtration equipment that surpasses the tolerances of any other manufacturer. The company uses the latest drafting software and modeling techniques to perform the engineering required to exceed industry standards. The final product is manufactured using state of the art welding equipment and welders certified under the ASME Boiler and Pressure Vessel Code. PGM currently employs 42 people. Read more.

EDIS to Become AccessNC

This fall, the N.C. Department of Commerce will launch a major project to re-brand and upgrade the capabilities of a critical online tool used by site selection decision makers. The state's Economic Development Intelligence System will become AccessNC, a one-stop information portal where site selectors can access the demographic and property information they need when considering North Carolina business locations.

One of the most innovative elements of AccessNC will be a new mobile app, a tool to access building and site data from a wide variety of smart phones and mobile devices. The mobile app will enable users to create lists of their favorite sites, take notes for each

Defense contracting companies continue to thrive in N.C.

In North Carolina, the aerospace, aviation and defense industry continues to grow, as was noted during the 2011 N.C. Aerospace Supplier Conference held Aug. 24 in Greensboro. In the United States, aerospace is currently mimicking the automotive industry's migration of production to the Southeast thanks to the region's workforce, manufacturing heritage, training programs and low costs of living and doing business. North Carolina stands out with 10,000 new workers coming out of the military already skilled in the industry.

"Over the next five to 10 years, we're going to see a definite change in the budget outlook for the Department of Defense and it will challenge us to come up with more efficient ways to do business," said Lieutenatht General Mark Shackelford in a News 14 Carolina article. U.S. Senator Kay Hagan announced this week that Ultra Armoring out of Shelby was awarded a \$44.7 million contract by the U.S. Special Operations Command's procurement division.

"North Carolina is home to some of the best defense businesses and contractors in the country, and Ultra Armoring is a superb example of the high-quality work our state has to offer the defense industry," said Hagan in the Charlotte Business Journal. <u>Read more</u>.
