Crisco joins Perdue on Asian mission

Sec. Keith Crisco joined Gov. Perdue for the 2009 Asia Business Development Trip. The mission will include official visits to Japanese and Chinese dignitaries and events, a number of client meetings and participation in the 33rd Annual Joint Southeast-U.S. Japan (SEUS) Conference. In a recent interview, Perdue said the trip underscores her No. 1 priority of creating and saving jobs. "As second and fourth largest trading partners, China and Japan represent significant growth opportunities for our state - especially in an economic downturn," she said. "When this recession ends, North Carolina must be poised to come out with strong economic relationships that allow us to create jobs in this state. This trip will help us do just that." Perdue addresses Global TransPark Board

Aircraft manufacturer Spirit Aerosystems broke ground last year on a new production facility and plans to hire more than 1,000 employees within the next three years. "I think with Spirit and the other smaller companies coming, we are really on our road to success," Perdue said.

Report: N.C. is top state in which to build a data center

North Carolina is the top state in the nation, and the United States is the No. 2 nation in which to build a data center, according to a

Premier to add 300 jobs in Charlotte

Gov. Bev Perdue on Oct. 14 announced that <u>Premier Inc.</u>, the largest healthcare alliance in the nation, will move its headquarters from California and expand in Charlotte, adding 300 jobs over the next five years and investing \$17.7 million. The project was made possible in part by a state Job Development Investment Grant.

Premier is owned by more than 200 not-for-profit hospitals and healthcare systems - ranging from small and rural to large inner-city facilities - which share clinical knowledge and leverage purchasing volume to improve healthcare quality while reducing costs. The alliance provides services to more than 2,200 U.S. hospitals and more than 63,000 other healthcare providers.

The company currently employs more than 750 workers in North Carolina. The 300 new jobs will pay an overall average wage of \$69,400 a year, not including benefits. That is higher than the Mecklenburg County annual average of \$49,400. <u>Read more</u>.

Southern Power breaks ground on Cleveland Co. plant

Southern Power, the subsidiary of Southern Company that acquires, builds, manages and owns generation assets that have been constructed for the wholesale market, on Oct. 13 broke ground on an electric generating plant near Grover, in southern Cleveland County. Commerce Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll and Assistant Sec. for Community Development Joseph Crocker participated in the groundbreaking.

The plant will, in part, provide electric power to the company's wholesale customers through long-term contracts with two North Carolina power companies: North Carolina Electric Membership Corporation and North Carolina Municipal Power Agency Number 1.

The generating plant, owned and operated by Southern Power, will consist of four Siemens F Class gas turbine units and will be able to generate approximately 720 megawatts at the summer peak. The units will be built on a portion of the 275-acre site, leaving the potential for future expansion. Commercial operation of all four units is expected in early 2012. <u>Read more</u>.
