Facebook to build data center in Rutherford County

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Nov. 11 that Facebook, the world's leading social networking service connecting more than 500 million people, will locate a multi-million dollar data center near Forest City in Rutherford County. The N.C. Dept. of Commerce's Margie Bukowski was the developer on this project.

The facility is expected to create more than 250 construction and mechanical jobs during its 18-month building phase. When construction is completed, the data center will employ around 35-45 full-time and contract workers. Facebook is expected to invest about \$450 million dollars in the new data center. Additional construction phases may be possible in the future, depending on business needs.

"We are proud that Facebook chose to make North Carolina a 'friend.' The feeling is certainly mutual," said Perdue. "You can't pick up a newspaper, read a magazine or flip on the television without hearing more great news about our state. The investment and jobs at the data center will be a boon to that region of the state, and will help confirm North Carolina's distinction as a global business destination."

Perdue said the state has been working with Facebook's representatives for about a year to help bring together the



Perdue announces 180 jobs with SPX

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Nov. 15 that SPX Corporation, a Fortune 500 multi-industry manufacturing leader, has initiated plans to build a new global headquarters in Mecklenburg County. The company's current lease expires in 2012. The N.C. Dept. of Commerce's Uconda Dunn was the developer on this project.

The company plans to create 180 jobs in Charlotte over the next five years and invest \$70 million toward the project, which was made possible in part by state grants from the Job Development Investment Grant program and One North Carolina Fund. This project is expected to begin in 2012.

"Congratulations to SPX on this terrific step forward, both for the company and our continuing efforts to create jobs in North Carolina, said Perdue. "This expansion of a Fortune 500 company is further proof that our top-ranked business climate is bringing new companies to North Carolina and helping old friends grow and thrive." <u>Read more</u>.

AdvantageWest Economic Summit includes state leaders

On Nov. 15 AdvantageWest held an economic summit in Asheville. Lt. Gov. Walter Dalton kicked off the summit. D.G. Martin of UNC-TV moderated a panel consisting of State Treasurer Janet Cowell, Institute of Emerging Issues Director Anita Brown-Graham and retired JP Morgan Chase executive Austin Adams. The summit concluded with the N.C. Dept. of Commerce recognizing AdvantageWest and its economic development partners for its pioneering work with fiber networks in western North Carolina and early marketing of the region to major technology companies like Google, Apple and Facebook, all of whom have built or will build data centers in the area.

Perdue vows to set government straight

Regulatory Review is Governor Bev Perdue's newest initiative aimed at setting government straight. It is a new process that asks you – citizens, community groups, businesses, state employees, local governments or schools – to tell us what rules and regulations in state government don't make sense.

The governor has instructed all of her cabinet agencies to stop creating new rules unless they are absolutely necessary and part of the project, the company plans to invest \$75 million in the new state-of-the-art facility and create 17 direct technology jobs over the next four years, as well as create other opportunities for local companies expected to be hired to support the operation of the data center. The N.C. Dept. of Commerce's Margie Bukowski was the developer on this project.

"Google, Apple, Facebook and now Wipro. North Carolina continues to be a prime location for growing and expanding global technology companies," said Perdue. "Technology leaders recognize that we have a talented workforce, comprehensive infrastructure and a low cost of doing business - a winning formula that has led them to expand operations and make investments to North Carolina." Obama nominates Smith to regulate Fannie, Freddie

President Barack Obama said Nov. 12 he will nominate N.C. Banking Commissioner Joseph A. Smith Jr. to become chief regulator for Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac as the administration prepares to overhaul the mortgage firms. Obama announced his intention to name Smith as director of the Federal Housing Finance Agency in an e-mail release. If confirmed by the Senate, the 61year-old regulator will replace FHFA Acting Director Edward J. DeMarco at the helm of an agency that has overseen Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac since they were seized by the federal government in 2008.

Obama to name North Carolina regulator Fannie, Freddie overseer (Bloomberg, Nov. 12) justifiable, until a thorough review can be completed. Workforce announces training grants

The N.C. Commission on Workforce Development recently announced grant awards totaling more than \$457,308 through the Incumbent Workforce Development Training Program. The funds will allow recipient firms to support educational and skills training for their workers. The employees of 25 companies throughout North Carolina will benefit from this round of training grants. A total of 59 proposals were submitted in September 2010 from 19 local area Workforce Development Boards. Of the 25 firms funded. 32 percent are located in North Carolina's most distressed counties and 64 percent are small companies with fewer than 100 employees. Kinston business wins Defense contract

Spatial Integrated Systems, Inc. of Kinston announced Oct. 26 that it has won a major proof of concept contract from the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency in response to its recent solicitation for the Anti Submarine Warfare Continuous Trail Unmanned Vessel program. The award builds on SIS's successful development to date of an autonomous maritime navigation and control system in partnership with NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory and Naval Surface Warfare Center, Carderock Division.

Under the initial six month contract, SIS will demonstrate the technical feasibility of a beyond stateof the art cognitive capability for tracking quiet diesel electric submarines for long periods of time under sparse remote supervisory control. The results of this demonstration will be used to generate preliminary performance specifications for the autonomy system of the ACTUV. <u>Read more</u>.

The community colleges have been asked to provide monthly reports regarding the number of students enrolled, courses offered and the number of jobs created and maintained. The numbers through Oct. 31 show that 18,078 students are enrolled in the program (up from 17,058 as of Sept. 30), and 2,639 courses have been offered (up from 2,491 as of Sept. 30).
