S&D Coffee to expand, create 200 new jobs

Governor Bev Perdue announced Nov. 19 that S&D Coffee, a privately-owned manufacturing and distribution company that produces coffee, tea and other beverages, will expand its presence in Concord. The company plans to create 200 jobs over the next five years and invest \$47 million. The project was made possible in part by state grants from the Job Development Investment Grant and the One North Carolina Fund award. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Margie Bukowski was the developer on this project.

Founded in 1927 in Charlotte, S&D Coffee began providing fresh roasted coffee to local and regional grocery stores. The company grew and expanded its product offerings and services to customers. Currently, S&D produces an extensive line of products that include roasted whole bean and ground coffee, specialty coffees, cappuccinos, lattes, hot chocolates, iced tea, hot tea, juices, syrups, toppers and condiments. The company supplies coffee products to restaurants, hotels, vending and offices.

N.C. Main Street creates jobs and revitalizes downtown areas across state

Governor Bev Perdue announced on Nov. 15 that the 2011-2012 N.C. Main Street Program posted impressive statistics for the 58 Main Street communities that participated. The 2011-2012 Main Street communities reported:

- \$96 million in public and private investments made
- 1,029 new jobs created
- 259 new businesses started
- 334 buildings renovated
- 242 facades improved
- 79,683 volunteer hours logged

N.C. Main Street assists selected communities across the state in restoring economic vitality to their historic downtowns. Main Street staff provides technical assistance, guidance and training to participating communities with a population under 50.000.

In addition, the N.C. Small Town Main Street program has been very successful in revitalizing the state's very smallest communities. The 2011-2012 Small Town Main Street Program reported:

- \$20.5 million in public and private investments made
- 278 new jobs created
- 105 new businesses started
- 66 buildings renovated
- 81 facades improved

N.C. companies showcase healthcare products and services in Germany

MEDICA 2013 was held last week in Dusseldorf, Germany. With more than 4,500 exhibitors from more than 100 countries showcasing a wide range of new products and latest technologies, the event brought together hundreds of buyers and sellers to discuss various business opportunities involved in the healthcare industry. More than 135,000 visitors attended the show, which has been held annually for more than 40 years.

With support from the N.C. Department of Commerce's International Trade Division, several North Carolina companies exhibited at the show and reported strong lead generation and results. These included ImmunoReagents of Raleigh, Dry Corp of Wilmington, and MethodSense and TCG Medtech of Durham.

N.C. Department of Commerce Director of Global Commerce John Loyack participated in the event to facilitate North Carolina exports and to assist the companies in forging new partnerships and strengthening existing business relationships in the life sciences market.

Prospective exporters in Eastern N.C. gain perspective

The U.S. Commercial Service, in partnership with North Carolina's Eastern Region's Economic Development Commission, BB&T International Services, the N.C. Department of Commerce's International Trade Division, and the Small Business Technology and Development Center, hosted an International Trade Compliance and Foreign Exchange Workshop on Nov. 13. The event, which took place in Wilson, brought in interested parties from as far away as WNC and Virginia.

The workshop served to promote exports from the U.S. Attendees learned about licensing and regulations, which can be tricky for those new to exporting. In addition, the event focused on foreign exchange, which explored the advantages and risks associated with selling overseas in foreign dominated currencies. N.C. Department of Commerce Business Development Manager Rick Hill gave an overview of the International Trade Division's services, ranging from export planning assistance to identification of distributors.

The seminar capitalized upon the success of a recent increase in exports from the state. The International Trade Administration recently announced new data that shows North Carolina merchandise exports increased 8 percent in 2011 compared to 2010, growing from \$24.9 billion to \$27.0 billion. North Carolina's export sales increased to many top destinations, including Honduras (up 36 percent), Germany (26 percent), China (17 percent), Canada (16 percent), and Mexico (9 percent). Key merchandise export categories included chemicals, machinery manufactures, transportation equipment, computer and electronic products, and textiles.



N.C. sites selected for numerous 2014 and 2015 sporting events

The NCAA has named 73 sites to serve as hosts for championships from 2013 through 2015. Representing 18 sports, this is the largest single announcement of sites ever done by the NCAA. Sites were selected for 54 of the 89 championships across all three divisions. The sites represent 30 states, including nine in North Carolina across five cities.

Boards. Of the nine businesses awarded, 89 percent are small companies with fewer than 300 employees throughout North Carolina. Funding will allow businesses to support educational and occupational skills training for their workers. These businesses are investing \$94,272 of their own resources to supplement the training funds.
