Trade division meets Chinese delegation

N.C. Department of Commerce Foreign Operations Director Derek Chen from the International Trade Division met Nov. 9 with a group of Chinese government officials who are participating in the Duke Center for International Development's State Administration of Foreign Experts Affairs of the People's Republic of China Executive Education Program. Chen spoke about commerce and economic development, and entertained questions. Business Development Manager Rick Hill also assisted in the meeting.

DCID offers short-term executive education programs designed to meet the needs of mid-career public policy professionals in government agencies, international institutions, the non-governmental community, and the private sector. For the past several years, DCID has provided training for the SAFEA of the People's Republic of China. Each year, 30 mid- and senior-level officials from various ministries within China's central government live in Durham for 18 weeks and take courses on topics such as public finance, policy analysis, management, negotiation and conflict resolution, and environmental policy. As part of the program, they attend meetings with local, state and federal agencies, private companies, and non-profit and non-governmental organizations. These meetings are set to complement and supplement lecture content with interactive conversations with practitioners of the various subject matter.

NCRC announces construction of ready-togo lab space

Officials from the N.C. Research Campus in Kannapolis are constructing ready-to-go lab space in the David H. Murdock Core Laboratory building. The 1,500-square-foot wet laboratory is the first pre-built, flexible lab space to be constructed at the NCRC since the campus opened four years ago.

"We have experienced a significant increase in the number of inquiries regarding ready-to-go lab space," said NCRC Vice President of Business Development Clyde Higgs. "The spec space incorporates a level of flexibility and affordability that will increase the attractiveness of the campus and meet the needs of both small and large companies that find the campus a good fit for their business."

The ready-to-go lab will be available in February 2013 and will accommodate one to three companies. Space includes administrative areas, bench tops, fume hoods, sinks and storage. Located on the third floor of the David H. Murdock Core Laboratory building, companies will have direct access to the David H. Murdock Research Institute and UNC Charlotte Bioinformatics Research Services Division. DHMRI is home to six laboratories specializing in genomics, metabolomics, proteomics, analytical sciences and advanced instrumentation such as a Bruker 950 MHz NMR spectrometer.

London's main airport. Currently, US Airways flies direct from CLT to London's Gatwick Airport, about 30 miles outside of London. The new Charlotte-to-Heathrow flights will operate daily; a detailed schedule and fares will be released at a later date. US Airways said the new flights will supplement existing service from Charlotte to Gatwick, and hasn't reached a final decision on whether the Gatwick service will continue or be shifted to Heathrow. US Airways also is seeking permission to start direct flights from Sao Paulo, Brazil to Charlotte.
