## Risk management consultant to create 430 jobs in RTP

Gov. Bev Perdue announced Dec. 14 that international risk management consultant IEM will move its headquarters from Baton Rouge, La., to Durham County, creating 430 jobs over the next six years. Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco and developer Bo Gregory, who worked on the project, were on hand with U.S. Rep. David Price for the announcement at Research Triangle Foundation in Research Triangle Park.

The announcement was made possible in part by a state Job Development Investment Grant and One North Carolina Fund award, and is contingent upon approval of local incentives.

"As a technology hub with a vast military presence, the relocation of IEM to North Carolina is a perfect fit that will benefit both the company and the state," Perdue said. "This partnership is another step in creating the top-paying, knowledge-based jobs that I am committed to bringing to North Carolina."

IEM is a privately held company that provides risk-based solutions for measuring and managing threats to people, infrastructure and information. Since IEM's founding in 1985, it has provided emergency management, homeland security,

### **NCREN** celebrates 25 years

More than 300 government officials, business leaders and educators from throughout North Carolina participated in MCNC's 25th Anniversary Community Celebration for the N.C. Research and Education Network (NCREN) Dec. 3 - 4 at SAS in Cary.

Former Gov. Jim Hunt was a driving force behind the initial launch of NCREN in the 1980s and provided keynote remarks on the first day. "NCREN is of great importance to public education in North Carolina," said Hunt. He called NCREN's accomplishments "impressive" but said "we still have work to do. We have to be bold, be creative and continue to have the vision to support connectivity and technology in our schools."

NCREN is one of the nation's first statewide education and research networks. It provides broadband communications technology services and support to K-12 school districts, higher education campuses and academic research institutions across North Carolina. MCNC offers the users of the NCREN network technology tools and services that guarantee equal access to 21st century learning and provides a technology network that is the foundation for change and innovation in North Carolina's educational systems. <u>Read more</u>.

military and information technology solutions to federal governmental agencies including the U.S. Department of Defense, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, as well as working with individual cities, ports and the private sector.

The 430 new jobs will pay an overall average wage of \$62,778 a year, not including benefits. That is higher than the Durham County annual average of \$57,772.

## Perdue signs executive order creating logistics task force

On Dec. 8, Gov. Bev Perdue signed Executive Order No. 32, establishing the Governor's Logistics Task Force. The task force will make recommendations to ensure that people and goods are able to move efficiently across North Carolina. The

Gov. Bev Perdue on Dec. 9 signed Executive Order No. 33 creating the North Carolina Complete Count Committee to coordinate Census activities at the state level. In addition, Gov. Perdue announced that 24,000 Census jobs will be available throughout North Carolina.

The decennial census will take place on April 1. It is administered by the federal government, but requires support at the state and local levels. The state's activities are coordinated by the state's Complete Count Committee (CCC). Individual localities also establish complete count committees in order to coordinate participation in the census.

Over \$400 billion in federal funds will be allocated annually based on the 2010 Census figures. Based on recent estimates, the state will receive approximately \$14,000 in federal funding per person counted over the next 10 years. In addition, Census data is the basis for the N.C. State Demographer's projections, which are used to determine the distribution of state funds.

The Census will also determine whether North Carolina will receive an additional seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. North Carolina narrowly received a 13th congressional district after the 2000 Census by a margin of approximately 800 people. <u>Read more</u>.

## Enrollment continues to climb in '12 in 6' program

The Division of Workforce Development continues to track the progress of Gov. Bev Perdue's JobsNOW "12 in 6" initiative. The community colleges have been asked to provide monthly reports regarding the number of students enrolled, courses offered and the number of jobs created and maintained. The numbers through Nov. 30 show that 5,433 students are enrolled in the program (up from 4,388 as of Oct. 31), and 691 courses have been offered (up from 524 as of Oct. 31).

### **Appalachian Region meets**

On Dec. 7, Olivia Collier, N.C. Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) program manager, held the annual ARC project meeting in Hickory, hosted by the Western Piedmont Council of Governments. Representatives from the six councils of governments in the ARC region attended, as well as staff of ARC funding partners including the Rural Center, U.S. Dept. of Agriculture Rural Development, Commerce Finance Center, and the Division of Community Assistance. The group shared status reports on current projects and discussed the 2010 State Strategy Statement, funding and possible projects for the 2010 fiscal year, plus application processing improvements.

## Armored vehicle company to expand in Mount Airy

Granite Tactical of Pilot Mountain has announced that it will expand into a 181,000-square-foot manufacturing facility in Mount Airy, creating 200 jobs in the process. Granite Tactical manufactures armored vehicles for law enforcement, government agencies and private security contractors. The Surry County Economic Development Partnership worked with several partners on the project including Commerce and the city of Mount Airy.

### Textile firm to bring 66 jobs to Burke County

Gov. Bev Perdue on Dec. 9 announced that Marves Industries, an international producer of nonwoven textile cushioning and insulator pads for use in mattresses headquartered in Mexico, will open a new North American facility in Burke County. The company will invest \$1.75 million and create 66 jobs in Hildebran. The announcement was made possible by a \$200,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund.

Marves Industries plans to open a plant in the former Bauer facility in Hildebran, using the existing building and equipment. The project's 66 new jobs will pay an average annual wage of \$33,636, not including benefits, which is higher than the Burke County average annual wage of \$30,628. #### Piedmont Triad Partnership announces successful fundraising campaign

BB&T Chief Executive Officer Kelly King, who also chairs the Piedmont Triad Leadership Group, announced at the Piedmont Triad Partnership's Dec. 10 Annual Meeting that the regional "Clusters of Opportunity" fund-raising campaign had substantially exceeded its \$1 million annual goal for five years.

King announced that pledges from more than 30 investors totaled \$1,301,000 through Dec. 10, with additional commitments expected. Assuming pledges are maintained for the five-year campaign period, the campaign will generate over \$6.5 million in new resources to promote four industry clusters in the Piedmont Triad: furnishings, logistics and distribution, nanotechnology, and regenerative medicine.

The Piedmont Triad Partnership Annual Meeting was attended by over 300 guests. The program featured remarks by 2008-09 Chairman Keith Vaughan, 2009-10 Chairman Jim Morgan, and a keynote presentation by Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco. Farooq Kathwari, CEO of Ethan Allen Interiors, was quoted extensively in the Dec. 12 New York Times article "The Do-It-Yourself Economy." He spoke about transferring the company's upholstery manufacturing to its North Carolina plant. The article looked at ways that various companies are using rapidly changing technology to help cut costs.
