Biofuels Manufacturer to Create 65 Jobs in Sampson County

Governor Pat McCrory and North Carolina Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced Nov. 2 that Biochemtex will be locating its new cellulosic biofuels production operations in Sampson County. The company and its partners plan to create 65 new jobs and invest approximately \$200 million over the next three years.

<u>Dallas Hardenbrook</u> served as the project developer for the N.C. Department of Commerce.

"Biochemtex's decision is further proof that the biofuels industry is positioned for growth across our state," said Governor McCrory. "We have the qualified talent, strong business climate, and attractive quality of life that companies need to succeed. We also have the agricultural capacity and flexibility to provide profitable energy crop options for North Carolina farmers and cost advantaged cellulosic feedstocks for Biochemtex and the advanced biofuels industry."

Biochemtex is a global technology solution provider specialized in biofuels and renewable chemicals. Biochemtex will operate in North Carolina as Carolina Cellulosic Biofuels, which was established in early 2013 as a Special Purpose vehicle for delivering the first commercial scale cellulosic biorefinery utilizing purpose grown energy crops in North America. This new plant will produce 20 million gallons per year of cellulosic biofuel from locally grown energy crops, agricultural residues, and woody biomass.

"Cellulosic Biofuels development is bringing new jobs to eastern North Carolina," said Secretary Decker. "Governor McCrory and I are committed to partnering with companies like Biochemtex to create jobs right here in Sampson County and throughout rural North Carolina."

Other partners that helped with this project include: the N.C. Department of Commerce, N.C. Community Colleges, Sampson County Economic Development Corporation, Sampson County, City of Clinton, N.C. Department of Agriculture, NCSU – N.C. Cooperative Extension and the Biofuels Center of North Carolina. <u>Read more.</u>

2014 North Carolina County Tier Designations



Commerce Issues 2014 Economic Development Tier Rankings

N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced <u>the</u> <u>county tier designations for 2014</u> on Nov. 27. The designations, which are mandated by state law, determine a variety of state funding opportunities to assist in economic development. <u>Download the county tier designations</u>.

"Our mission is to enhance job opportunities for all North Carolinians, no matter where they live in the state," said Decker. "The tier rankings provide critical tools that help us in various economic development programs and ultimately, help attract businesses to the state."

Using a statutory formula outlined in the General Statue § 143B-437., the N.C. Department of Commerce assembles required statistics for each of North Carolina's 100 counties, applies the formula and assigns a tier designation ranking from one to three. Tier 1 counties are the most economically distressed and Tier 3 counties are the least. Eligible businesses that locate in lower-tiered counties are eligible for some grant programs and larger tax credits than those that locate in higher-ranked areas.

Thirteen counties will change tier designations for 2014. Beaufort, Greene, Pasquotank, Perquimans and Surry counties will shift from a Tier 2 to a Tier 1 ranking. Cherokee, McDowell, Wilkes, and Yancey counties will move from Tier 1 to Tier 2 counties. Franklin and Haywood counties, currently Tier 3 counties, will shift to a Tier 2 ranking. Guilford and Lincoln counties will move from a Tier 2 to a Tier 3 ranking.

The law calls for the 40 most distressed counties to become Tier 1 counties, the next 40 counties to be designated as Tier 2 and the 20 most prosperous counties to become Tier 3 counties. <u>Read more.</u>

Advanced Forensic DNA Lab Opens in Greenville

Genome ID Group, LLC has established a state-of-the-art laboratory facility, known as The Center for Advanced Forensic DNA Analysis in Greenville. The company is focused on identifying and applying proven scientific solutions to fit the challenging tasks and casework needs for DNA identification.

Genome ID Group's Chief Science Officer Dr. Kevin McElfresh is a recognized thought leader in forensic DNA analysis, and has played a key role in the development and evolution of technology and its application to crime scene casework analysis from the inception of DNA analysis within forensic science in the 1980s.
